A Reading from the Book of Exodus

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness. Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let

you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

Fun Facts with Father Frank: Each Sunday, as I prepare to proclaim the Gospel in the midst of the congregation, I take the opportunity to turn and look at the faces of everyone who is in the congregation. This is something that I found myself doing a few years ago. For me, proclaiming or announcing the Gospel and then preaching on it is more than a routine or a part of the liturgy. It is a profoundly intimate and spiritual moment. I am proclaiming this Gospel and am about to preach this sermon to this specific group of people (in-person and on livestream). When I write sermons, I pray over the text and seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit to break open a particular text in a way that will be meaningful and inspirational for those to whom it is preached. As our relationship of priest and people grows, this will happen in more concrete ways. Looking around and taking each of you in as I look at your faces, helps me to connect with this deeper meaning of proclaiming and preaching. It helps me to join more fully with you as we hear and reflect on God's Holy Word. - Father Frank
